# **BLABY STOKES CE PRIMARY SCHOOL**



## **Pupil Premium Report 2013-2014**

Pupil Premium is allocated to all schools and is based upon the numbers of children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM) and children who have been looked after continuously for more than 6 months or have been in receipt of FSM within the past 6 years.

At Blaby Stokes C of E Primary School, we recognise the importance of ensuring we are providing for all Pupil Premium children irrespective of ability. We continually strive to see improvement continue and the 'gap' narrowed. Our assessment of the quality of provision is based on continual monitoring by teachers, SENco, SLT and the Governing Body as well as regular progress meetings with teachers.

### **FUNDING**

For the academic year 2013-14, Blaby Stokes used a portion of our Pupil Premium Funding to train Teachers and Teaching Assistants in the use of the Read Write Inc. scheme for Key Stage 1 pupils this was in order to narrow the gap between FSM and Non FSM children.

£953 per pupil (originally set at £900 – increased later in academic year) + £300 (Services children) Funding comes into the school budget at 3 stages of the year (July, December and March)

Free School Meal costs are deducted from the total amount throughout the year.

#### STRATEGIES ADOPTED

The SLT used the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF – formally known as the Sutton Trust Toolkit) to strategize on a key way to spend our pupil premium funding. After consultation with staff, it was decided that a number of different strategies would be used for 2013-14, which not only supported Pupil Premium pupils, but also allowed us to tackle achievement in Reading, Writing, Phonics and Maths, which were a main focus on the SDP for 2013-14.

## Results and impact:

All data and analysis of impact are reported to the Governing Body as well as in depth monitoring by SLT and Governor with responsibility for Pupil Premium. An analysis of individuals is made to understand barriers to learning and how these can be addressed. An evaluation of what has worked well and what we could do better forms part of the process for future provision and spending, this feeds into the whole school development plan.

Impact of introduction of Read Write Inc - 77% achieved the pass mark in the phonics test (exceeding National figures 74%). The previous year School achieved 71% (so 2014 sees an increase of 6%). More importantly the lowest mark was 13 compared with 4 last year, everyone else scored above 20 marks.

There is no gap between Pupil Premium and Non Pupil Premium in Reading, the gap (compared with 2013) in Maths has narrowed from 31.2% to 3.2%. The gap in writing has informed the School Development Plan for 2014/2015

Pupil Premium Pupils out performed Non Pupil Premium Pupils in Reading. The gap in Writing and Maths is narrowing. This has informed the SDP for 2014/15. Intervention groups are having an impact on achievement for all groups and Pupil Premium Pupils.
