Dear Parents / Carers,

#### Ofsted Inspection 14th and 15th March 2017:

Attached to this letter is the Ofsted Report following our recent inspection. This report will be available on the Ofsted website from Monday 15<sup>th</sup> May 2017.

The judgements made in the report are disappointing. We were aware of a dip in our Statutory Assessment Test results at the end of Key Stage 2 in 2015, however, the school met the national standards in 2014 and 2016 and we weren't expecting to be judged as inadequate. Ofsted inspections are increasingly outcomes driven. Following the results in 2015 we have been working even harder to improve the outcomes for pupils. Ofsted have agreed that;

- leaders (including governors) demonstrate the capacity to improve
- current action plans will support the school moving forward.

The report highlights the many strengths of the school (please see the reverse of this letter for some examples), as well as outlining the areas that we need to develop. We urge you to read the report in full to recognise the many positives which match the ethos for education that we value as a school.

It is obviously very disappointing for all members of the school community that the outcome of the inspection has concluded the school rating is inadequate. All staff in school are committed to providing the best education for the children of Blaby Stokes C of E Primary School. We value that, as quoted in the report 'the overwhelming majority of parents are highly supportive of the school' and we would like to thank parents/carers who provided their views to the inspectors and who were so supportive during a very challenging two days for us.

We would like to say we are incredibly proud of our pupils whose behaviour and attitudes were remarked on so positively by the inspectors - these comments were shared with pupils at a whole school assembly the day after the inspection.

To give you an opportunity to discuss any concerns you may have regarding the report and the progress that we are already making to improve the school, we would like to invite you to a meeting on **Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30 p.m. in Stokes Hall.** This meeting is for adults only; children should not attend. We will be talking to children about the report over the next few weeks to explain the outcomes and gather their views about ways forward.

Please be assured that everyone in school is working hard to address the key issues that have been raised in order to create the very best learning environment we can for your children.

- 'Pupils are well informed about how to stay safe from potential risks'
- 'Pupils benefit from many opportunities to take responsibility'
- 'Teaching, the curriculum and the schools' ethos together ensure that the pupils are well rounded, well informed and polite'
- 'They get along with their teachers and each well.
   Teachers help pupils learn how to build bridges with their friends if ever they fall out'

### OUTCOMES FOR PUPILS

- 'In mathematics, better teaching means that pupils are beginning to make faster progress'
